What does the project include?

A paving overlay will be applied to Centennial Boulevard from Aspen Street to Prescott Street. To meet current standards, most of the existing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) sidewalk ramps require updates.

Will there be a street closure on Centennial Blvd?

No. However, at times you may have to wait for construction equipment to clear the street or have one-lane access.

How will this affect me?

You may experience minor travel delays during construction. You also may hear and see signs of construction. Access for pedestrians, including those using a wheelchair, will be available through or around the work zone.

Why do the project?

Springfield voters approved a five-year, \$10 million general obligation bond to fund street repairs on a list of priority commercial streets in need of repair, including a 2,600 foot section of Centennial Boulevard. These repairs will extend the useful life of the street.
