First Amendment Audits

- The library has had 2 First Amendment auditor experiences. One on September 1st and one on Wednesday September 28th.

- The Springfield History Museum is hosting a <u>community gathering on Tuesday, October 4th</u>,
 <u>6:00 7:30p.m.</u> that welcomes community members who identify as Asian American, Native
 Hawaiian and/or Pacific Islander to join us to discuss and inform the next chapter of our annual
 exhibit, ILLUMINATION. The gathering will be hybrid with both virtual and in-person
 opportunities to attend.
- This next chapter of ILLUMINATION is community-driven (that means you!) with a tremendous team including Aimee Yogi, Thomas Hiura and Melissa (Mimi) Nolledo. We will use interviews, photographs and personal objects to collect and share stories that explore what it means to be Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander in Springfield, Oregon.
- The exhibit last year, which featured stories of six local Mexican-Americans, was well received.
 In spite of COVID we engaged over 1,100 exhibit visitors and over 31,300 social media campaign engagements. We heard from many community members that they appreciated seeing the

- inclusion of non-white/non-pioneer stories, faces, artifacts etc. in the museum. Several people, including several women who identified as Asian American, wanted to know if we were interested in *their* stories. We enthusiastically responded yes!

- Your Museum is working to overcome the white supremacy inherent in museum institutions

 the people of Springfield today -- their stories, contributions, struggles, successes, etc.
